Special Olympics SA hosted a Provincial coaches training in the Northwest Province at Christiana School for the blind from the 17th- 20th September. The Coaches ,athletes and partners who participated in the training were taken through the general orientation of Special Olympics which included Unified Sports by Sports coordinator Mantsi Thaganyane. Special Olympics identified Christian school for the blind as the ideal school to host this training as the values of the school coincide with those of the organisation. The school's ideals speak of inclusion and integration for individuals who are differently abled which includes pupils with an intellectual disability. North West Provincial Coordinator Marlene Schutte was also in attendance to ensure the smooth running of the training and also meet her new on the ground recruits.



One of the highlights of this training was receiving the use of the school's premises at no charge, we also had the honour of being joined by 4 athletes during the training as well. Individuals from the Department of Sport North West were also present and are now certified SOSA coaches. This commitment from Government goes to show the lengths and stance the province is taking to understanding Special Olympics in order to be able to create life changing opportunities for people with an intellectual disability at government level

We would like to thank the schools who got involved on the final day of practical's for providing the transport and meals for their respected pupils, the final day of practical's gave the coaches the feel of running an event which they will later conduct.

Special Olympics South Africa sports manager Sibusiso Ngcobo facilitated a coaches training in the Northern Cape Province, at the Elizabeth Conradie Inclusive School in the Fraans Baard District Kuruman. A total of 46 coaches were trained which included an incredible 8 athletes and 4 Unified® youth leaders present. We are very proud of this fact as this, is currently the highest number of athletes recruited and trained as coaches this year.

As is in every training the coaches were taken through the overview of Special Olympics, Unified sports, Games Management, Differences between Mental illness and Intellectual Disability, differences between SO and Paralympics, Practical session on running a Special Olympics Local event and Divisioning.



We are also proud to announce that this coaches training allowed us to reach a region that has never been activated. We cannot wait to see the development and growth to come out of Kuruman. We would like to send a huge thank you to the coaches from the community clubs and the coaches recruited from Grassroots Soccer ,who are now certified SOSA coaches.

The South African National AIDS Council Trust appoints Special Olympics South Africa to implement HIV/AIDS and Lifestyle curriculum for people with an Intellectual Disability



We are excited to announce that Special Olympics South Africa, the **South African National AIDS Council Trus**t and the **Department of Social Development** have partnered to introduce a curriculum which will address the lack of knowledge on **HIV/Aids**that individuals with an intellectual disability aren't provided.

Special Olympics recently had the opportunity to present and introduce the concept of the

curriculum to the community of Mawewe in Mpumalanga during the launch of the curriculum where the **Deputy Minister of Social Development Henrietta Bogopana Zulu** was present.

Special Olympics South Africa will be focusing on implementing the curriculum on the following 3 provinces: Kwazulu Natal, Limpopo and Mpumalanga.



This program aims to comprehensively circulate knowledge and also support initiative to develop capacity of individuals with disabilities for effective and efficient access to appropriate services for their needs.

The initiative of the curriculum and the partnership of the organisations was brought on by statistics shown by the South African National Prevalence, incidence and behavior report which states the significant decrease in knowledge about the transmission and prevention of *HIV/ Aids* that individuals with intellectual disabilities are exposed to.

We are extremely excited about this new journey that awaits us as an organisation, our athletes and their families. Thank you to the South African National AIDS Council Trust for this amazing opportunity, we cannot wait to see the change this initiative will bring to the lives of the athletes of Special Olympics South Africa.
